Tips from our Maintenance Department

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Clear Outdoor Drains

Keep outdoor drains, window wells, and basement exits free of leaves and debris to prevent water pooling and potential flooding.

Keep Heating Vent Covers Clear

Ensure heating vent covers are unobstructed by furniture or other items to allow for better air circulation and improve home heating efficiency.

Check Dryer Venting

Ensure that your dryer's venting system is properly connected to the machine and discharges to the exterior. This helps prevent humidity and condensation issues and improves dryer efficiency.

Household Items that Clog Pipes

Baby wipes, cleaning wipes, sanitary products, paper towels, fats and oils can all lead to serious plumbing issues. Unlike toilet paper, these items do not break down easily and can cause blockages in pipes, potentially resulting in sewage backups. It's important to avoid disposing of these materials in toilets and sinks to maintain proper drainage.

tenant spotlight

Doris Power

For this edition of Tenant Spotlight, we sat down for a conversation with Doris Power – a scattered house Tenant of more than 40 years, and an accomplished advocate for Tenants,



women, and the disability community. Doris shared many stories from her amazing life -About how she has constantly fought for others, while facing very real struggles as a single mother raising six children on a meager income. She told us about the sacrifices she had to make, the risks she had to take, and how her spirituality has guided her over the vears.

Doris was one of the core Tenant leaders who successfully organized against the proposed sell-off of the scattered homes in 2011, which led to the transfer to Circle where the homes are now protected as affordable forever. As we looked through pictures from Doris' 50+ years fighting for housing, she shared: "You see, if you get into a fight, you're gonna be in it for a long time. And 60 years from now, they'll still be battling."

When the sell-off of the scattered homes was announced in 2011, Doris immediately got involved.

"There were scattered homes around the corner from where I live, and a Tenant in one of them called up the media and Tenant advocates. She was in tears because her City Councillor was with the media on her front lawn – Taking pictures of her house, and announcing that it was going to be sold. And she's sitting there inside, with her kids and everything, wondering: What is going on?! That was where it started."

Doris worked with the group

Tenants4SocialHousing to organize a powerful campaign to save the homes. Through the struggle, many people were involved – scattered home Tenants, other low-income Tenants, civil society groups, and politicians – but Doris shared that the core group of organizers was small, but mighty:

"You'd like to pretend it was a lot bigger than it was. This is often the case. We've seen country-wide movements of six people! One person can get the law changed. You don't need a lot of people, but you have to be connected to the people...We sent letters to every Tenant. We didn't get a lot of responses, but in the east end we organized a meeting and packed the hall."

In speaking about this experience, Doris wanted to emphasize this: "Never say something is impossible. I've done things, only to learn afterwards that they were "impossible". Lots of people said saving the houses couldn't be done, and look where we are."



Knowing that Doris played such an important role in the journey that led to Circle's creation, we wanted to know what she would like to see from us as a housing provider. She spoke about the need to protect our Tenants' privacy and dignity: "It's very important to stand up for Tenants when there's a NIMBY in the area. I have a neighbour who called TCHC about me over the years, with totally unacceptable complaints about me and my family. This would never be entertained if I wasn't living in social housing." Doris also spoke about the need for Tenants to be vigilant and organize against unsafe or illegal actions by their landlords – be they private, government, or nonprofit.

When we asked Doris about highlights from her advocacy over the years, she pointed to her key role in the founding of the TC Douglas Housing Co-op, and the important work she's done shedding light on the struggles of abused women, and people with disabilities. Most of all, she shared that she is proud of bringing awareness to poverty in Canada, despite the difficult realities that come with of a life of activism.

"You can't talk about poverty without talking about health, education, employment, justice...and housing is what holds it all together."

We wanted to know what has driven Doris all this time. She talked about the injustices within the system, and the way that needs aren't being met for everyone, while allowing others to take advantage "and nobody has the guts to speak up about it. That bothers me, and that's what keeps me going...We have to be more understanding that housing is not just bricks and mortar, it's people's lives, and everybody has a story."

A Note on Eviction Prevention

One thing we take very seriously at Circle is our commitment to being clear and transparent with Tenants, even if the message we're sharing is not an easy one. So, we would like to take a moment to address a very important issue: Evictions. Our staff have heard that, in the past, some rules related to rent payments and RGI may have not been enforced consistently.

Circle is a small organization that was established to keep your homes wellmaintained and affordable forever: In order to do that, we must collect rent and follow all the laws and regulations that govern us as an affordable housing provider. This includes the Residential Tenancies Act, RGI legislation, and all rulings at the Landlord Tenant Board.

Our staff are committed to working with Tenants to maintain your housing, but if the rules can't be followed, the situation may progress up to eviction. This is uncomfortable, but we want to be clear about it. We all face challenges, and we

understand that it can be difficult to pay rent on time. If you are in this situation, our staff will work with you on a solution. You should know the rules and how they affect you and your household – The full RGI Policy Manual is available on the Policies page of our website, or from your CTSW.

Currently, more than 80% of Circle households are paying their full rent on-time, which is great. We are working with the remaining number to maintain their tenancy. Thanks to the cooperation of Tenants and our staff, about 20-30 potential evictions are being prevented each month. Unfortunately, in three cases so far, these evictions have been filed with the sheriff, and some remain unresolved. If you are struggling to pay your rent on time, please reach out to our staff right away.

Tax Season is Around the Corner

As part of the Annual Review process, all RGI Tenants must provide our staff with their Notice of Assessment (NOA) from the Canada Revenue Agency. So, doing your taxes on-time is very important. Having trouble finding an affordable tax clinic near you? Don't worry, we've got you covered! Keep an eye on our blog for a list of free and discounted tax clinics near you, coming soon.
